Great Umoja:





- 2. Focus on the inner self and not the external


- 3. Be a good example

The Key To Unity Is Defining What It Is

Have you ever seen a group of people, talking about how important having a single unified vision is, and then turn right around and go and do something that doesn't align with said vision? The key to unity is taking the time to define what it is. It is one thing to talk about unity but it is another thing to be clear on what it looks like. Has your tribe, collective, or community taken the time to define what Unity is?

For those of us who are trying to create change in our communities and in this world, there can be so many different feelings, reactions and actions that can derail our efforts. If we have not taken the time to define what our mission is, we will find ourselves constantly being pulled in different directions based on whatever issue has come up in the moment. We as a people have been taught that opposites are bad, but we forget that without them there would be no balance. The key is for us to learn when it is time for us to take a stand on an issue based on what we have defined as our mission and when it's okay to let someone else take the lead. In order for us to come together as a people, we must first learn how to work together. In order to build a revolution, you need to be able to work with others—but that doesn't mean you have to agree about everything. There are plenty of things that other people are passionate about that don't line up with your mission. Some people might be inspired by the same cause as you, but their goals and plans for getting there may not be yours.



If we're going to create real change, we have to learn how to identify how our skills and passion can best serve the greater good. This means we have to make peace with the fact that our attention and energy will be pulled in different directions every day, depending on what's happening in the world around us.

Are there certain things that inspire you more than others? What does your gut tell you when something comes up that isn't directly related to your mission? Do you feel like it deserves your immediate attention?

Or do you know right away that it's something better left alone?

We can't always control what comes up in our lives, but we CAN take control of how we react when it does. You can't do everything, but you can choose what matters most.

Tribe Talk - Character

Character is the sum total of who you are and what you do. It is like a multilayered cake: your values, beliefs and actions make up the individual layers and when they come together, they create something truly special – YOU! Our character bridges the gap between who we are and what we do. Character isn't something we put on in front of others, it is what defines us when everyone leaves the room. It's that extra mile we go when no one is looking; it's saying "thank you" to our barista; it's being honest with ourselves. A person's character is a part of their personality, the only difference being that the word 'character' can be applied to an entire group of people. There is no one element that defines your character, but rather it is your actions and words put together over time that does. Character is more than just a few core values. It's what drives you to make decisions and how those decisions are made. Character is how you choose to live your life, and what makes you different from everyone else. Everyone has their own unique style in which they live day-to-day -- different hobbies, interests or beliefs -- even though the same basic principles apply to all of us. You have a choice to make. You can either choose to be who you are and then learn what you need to learn, or you can choose to be someone else that doesn't exist. The truth is that your character is the only thing that bridges the gap between what you know, who you are and what you need to know in order to get where you want in life. You may be thinking: "Wait, what? I could be a different person at work than I am at home?!" Yup! This is called being inauthentic. You don't have to do this. You can be the same person all the time, and keep showing up for your customers with heart and soul. Being inauthentic means you're not present. It's like hiding behind a mask. We think that if we were more like someone else, people would like us better or we'd get ahead quicker. But that's not how it works! Your character is a muscle you need to exercise every day. The more you show up authentically for others, the stronger this muscle becomes over time. Success is not a straight line

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If you try something and it doesn't work out, that's great! You now have the experience to know what doesn't work so that you can improve upon it. Learn from your mistakes. Don't let failure discourage you or make you want to quit. Failure is part of the process. Learn from your mistakes, make adjustments, keep trying, and eventually you will succeed! You're the only one responsible for your success. Not your boss, not your coworkers, not your

competitors. You. If you were lucky enough to grow up with parents who nurtured you and gave you an excellent education, then congratulations—you've got a head start over most of the world. But if you want to succeed in life, it will be because of you and the choices you make—not because of where you went to school or what family connections might have gotten you an internship at a top company. Remember that most successful people in this world came from



nothing, with nothing but their own drive and gumption as they worked their way up. It is all too easy to blame others when things don't go our way. It's somebody else's fault I didn't get promoted! It's somebody else's fault I didn't close that sale! It's somebody else's fault my business isn't taking off! And so on and so forth... But we all know deep down that it isn't anybody else's fault....it is ours--and ours alone--for making the wrong choices. We are responsible for our actions and choices: no one can make them for us or force us into doing something we don't want to do (unless we're held at gunpoint). We must take responsibility for our own actions and use them to build our character before we need it -- otherwise we may find ourselves lacking when times get tough later on in life I have found in my travels that it is the person of character who always makes the most difference. The person with great character can be counted on. He or she can inspire others to greatness, because their character is so strong that they are able to stand up to difficult situations and not falter. They have integrity; they do what is right because it's right. They know that many times being successful requires them doing the hard thing, but they choose to do it anyway because it's the right thing for their team/community/family. They exercise self-discipline when no one else is looking, and are trustworthy and consistent when you need them most. These individuals are courageous they are willing to risk their position or even their life for a higher cause or greater good - even when it means standing alone against all odds. These individuals have strength and conviction of purpose, which allows them to be effective leaders in whatever arena they find themselves in - whether they are a housewife, an architect, an athlete or a soldier. Umoja In Motion


Great Ujima;

We are moving fastly through the Nguzo Saba, and as I stated putting these pieces together for the week of Umoja was going to be hard. I have to focus on the germ of Umoja that lies within each principle and for some reason that has always been hard for me. Unity is a principle that I have been shooting for since my entrance into this Kwanzaa community but for some reason it is the one that appears to be hiding the most from us.

Until, one day I stepped back (from the community, and activities) for a little while and looked into our community, village, and tribes as an observer. All of a sudden the reason hit me on why it was hard for me to articulate as well as see Umoja in our community. The reason being we were knee deep in it, and didn't realize it. We were experiencing "Not being able to see the forest for the trees in real life". Umoja was a force that flowed in our community and most could not see it because they were smack dab in the middle of it. The Umoja force was working, but we were like fish in water. Although we were immersed in it we did not know. This is what is hard for me to describe, but what I can use the other principles to do is to use them as a tool hopefully to help you see the Umoja.

Today the goal is to talk about Ujima, and its relation to Umoja. Ujima is nothing but our Umoja in motion. What I mean is that everything that the definition of Umoja calls for is used in motion and in action through the principle of Ujima. We all have to work hard to help each other and build a better community as well as put into play all of the principles that have been established by Kwanzaa. It's not about sitting around and talking about them, it's about getting out there and doing something! It's about using what we have learned from years of study and experience to help others in our community, especially those who are less fortunate than we are. We all

need each other to survive; without one another we would not exist at all because none would be able to provide food or shelter or protection from thieves or criminals who might want what they do not deserve (which is everything). The idea behind this principle goes back thousands of years when people lived in small groups called tribes where each person was responsible for making sure everyone got enough food, water, shelter etc. This concept still holds true today even



though most people don't think too much about it anymore because they're so used to having everything provided for them by society at large instead of relying on themselves and their neighbors like we used to in the past.

If you take a few moments and step back you can see that Umoja has always been with us, we just don't recognize it. Now I also want to stress the fact that since umoja is a force it can be harnessed and others outside of our community have figured out how to use the winds of our unity to fill the sails of their merchant vessels. Another reason that we don't see our Umoja is because the power of it is being diverted. It is like a powerful river that has been dammed up and all those who used to depend on the river have given up and moved to other things to survive. The trickle of the river is still there, it just will require some of us to decide to blow up the dam. We have to understand that we are the power, we have the might and the minds to accomplish this. What stands in the way is not our brothers, what stands in the way is those who prey on our divisions. I ask all my brothers and sisters to come together because in unity there is strength and it is only when we truly come together, it will be possible for us to realize our Umoja, it will take a true understanding on our parts not just of what Umoja was but also of what it can become. To help out here are a few things that we can do start recognizing Umoja in our Community, because the Umoja force is here, we need to open our eye:

1. Remember and discuss the meaning of Umoja

2. Start conversations about the movement and why it is important

3. Write about the impact of Umoja in your life and how you demonstrate it through Ujima

4. Participate in a service project in your community with your tribe

5. Make sure your voice is heard either directly or through a representative in the community, city and beyond

6. Support those who commit to uplifting the community



Are there any specific forms of currency that help circulate money better? 4. How do we create opportunities for employment in our communities? 5. What are some ways you can use your resources by "investing" them into your community? I want us to look at these questions and begin to look for



solutions in our tribes all over this country. Yesterday we looked at the fact that our power was being used by others for their benefit. What we are looking for today are ways that we can begin to use the power of that unity for ourselves, but it will require us to direct all of our resources toward solving the problem. We will have to activate all 5 parts of our being and get to work. This is not a problem that we will be able to just think or pray our way out of. We are going to have to roll up our sleeves and hit the streets with our entire Self clicking on all cylinders.

Great Nia:




